You may have noticed media coverage of the Government's recent release of a new Policy Paper which outlines reforms to the schools and Special Educational Needs & Disabilities (SEND) support in England. The reforms aim to ensure that every child can achieve and thrive.

We are pleased to share that our Trust strategy for supporting all children is already very closely aligned with these national changes which focus on identifying needs earlier, supporting children in our mainstream classrooms, and working more closely with specialists—areas we have already prioritised across our schools and are in the process of rolling out.

We use early screening upon entry to our Reception classes, clear support plans, and regular reviews, all developed in increasing partnership with families. We invest heavily in staff training, and we use a range of teaching approaches and are increasingly using technology to make sure every child gets the right help at the right time, with a strong focus on confidence, belonging and wellbeing.

New national expectations include shared standards, digital support plans and closer collaboration between public services. Our systems are already well prepared, and we will continue to strengthen our approach—maintaining our focus on helping every child to feel supported, included and able to succeed. Please be assured of our firm commitment to the endeavours of the new government policy papers and to strengthening the strategy that has already begun within our Trust.
